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Meet Report - Sail Mhor Hostel 5th / 6th October

The Sail Mhor meet took place as planned and it is understood that, although the weather was mixed, everyone was able to get out and do the things they planned – what they actually did will have to be left to your imagination...

In lieu of a full meet report a couple of other things Club members have been up to over the last month:

Slip sliding along the Fife Coastal Path by Richard Christie

Something a bit different from climbing hills and a great alternative for when the cloud is down on the tops - and it's here on our doorstep. The Fife Coastal Path has a total length of 117 miles but it can easily be split up into day walkable sections making use of either two cars or public transport. Having previously walked the section from St Monan's to Crail with Steve and Mags: Richard, Wattie and Maureen decided to tackle the next section from Crail to St Andrews on a recent Sunday.



Much to Wattie's consternation Richard arrived unusually minutes early ready for Wattie to drive the three of them through to St Andrews. They arrived parked for free beside the bus station and had a few minutes to wait for the No.95, 10:13 which efficiently bus



carried them past sun lit fields and delivered them to Crail for 10:35. A couple of minutes walk down through the village soon saw them on the costal path and looking out across the calm sea to the Isle of May and beyond to the bass Rock.

After walking through the static caravan site, the first 2 km of the walk eastwards to Fife Ness was straight forward will great views over the sparkling blue sea. Straight forward it may have been - but Richard still managed to fall flat on his face when he stepped into a hole at the edge of the path - fortunately he picked a bit that was not too wet and no harm was done apart to his pride.

Just after rounding Fife Ness a fellow walker pointed out some dolphins leaping out of the water 300m off shore which was great to see and then it was on to Cambo Sands beside Kingsbarns. The beach was a popular spot with families and dog walkers and the car park was almost full. A kilometer or so past the sands they reached the approximate halfway point at Airbow Point which was a good spot to stop for lunch. After another kilometer the Kenly Water forced a detour inland to the foot bridge at Burnside Farm. Just after starting to walk up beside the river a couple coming the other way advised some 'hellish mud' lay ahead. It turned out not to be the worst mud ever seen but it was certainly slippery and clung to the books. Slipperyness turned out to be the common theme for the second half of the day - if it was not slippery, slimy mud it was extremely slippery sandstone stepping stones laid along some sections of the path. The



inland detour added a bit of distance but was worth it for the extended view which came with gaining some height.

Back on the coast proper the next noteworthy sight was the colourfull Buddo Rock sandstone outcrop. From there on the path meandered up and down sometime on the beach and sometime along the cliff edge. On one of the traversing

Loch Sionascaig by Kayak by Dave Paton



A year ago Olly and I had the idea of Kayaking on Loch Sionascaig. Where's this? It's the large loch in the middle of Inverpolly National Nature Reserve and is therefore pretty remote. The plan was to kayak out to the large island in the middle of it, which we thought would be a place where few people actually set foot on.


The trouble with this idea is that there isn't a road that goes near it. So we needed a plan. If we couldn't get close to it we needed a loch we could get close to and kayak over to get us closer and then drag the kayaks over land until we could launch them on Loch Sionascaig.

We had scouted a possible launch site last year but never got the chance to do the trip. This year

we were a bit more determined, so we drove down the Lochinver to Stac Polly road to a point near the shore of Loch Buine Moire. As we were about to launch, I had a thought. That though was that I had left my lifejacket back in the house. So back we went for it. About 45 minutes later we set off across the loch at last. Just as we almost reached the far shore I

Now to haul the kayaks across a narrow strip of land to Boat Bay; which is not quite a loch on its own, but connected to Loch Sionascaig by a narrow channel. I had made a bit of a harness from some webbing straps, looking a bit like 'Scott of the Antarctic', to make this easier. Olly was less subtle [surely not?], he simply hauled his by rope. Soon we were able to re-launch.

So far so good we were now paddling on Boat Bay on absolutely calm water with things looking good for the trip. We had a short stop on an island at the opening of Boat Bay and could see our objective. However, we could now see that the main loch was a lot rougher, being much more exposed to the wind.

The loch indeed proved to be quite rough and with neither of us being particularly experienced we decided to head for an island a bit closer to the shore. Here we had lunch and, although disappointed, were able to enjoy being in such a remote spot.
